3-A <u>Social Justice Through Bilingual Education</u> Level: EC / EL Presented by <u>Karen Simon</u>

This workshop will deepen the capacity and expertise of Montessori teachers serving Spanish-speaking children in bilingual classrooms. We will focus on language development, dual literacy, culturally relevant and globally competent teaching, and strong family connections. We will present ideas on how to develop a strong and healthy pride in heritage of Spanish-speaking children and how to involve parents and family members in this endeavor.

3-B Why Montessori schools have become more and more popular Level: EL / AD Presented by Daniel Jutras

We will be exploring reasons to continue in Montessori starting by recognizing the exceptionally inspirational and stubborn Maria Montessori and her approach to education. This includes the awareness of modern parents, the foundations for children to will, to think and to act by themselves, as well as the current recognition of the scientific community.

3-E Who's in Charge: Managing Elementary Planning Level: EL Presented by Rose Dorer

Rose will help you manage planning in your elementary classroom: how to follow the children's planes of development, sensitive periods human needs and tendencies; and weekly and daily scheduling. Lesson planning along with how to give good lessons and presentations and effective follow up work. Sample planning forms will be shown. Time management through organizing the Great Period, open lesson policy, group lessons, key lesson and more will all be discussed along with mindfulness activities such as making Silence on a daily basis.

Friday Session 3 Presenter Bios listed in order of presentation

<u>3-A - Karen Simon</u>— Karen Simon has been a Montessori educator for over 25 years, teaching children 2 ½ - 12 years old, as well as adults. She was born and raised in Venezuela and has lived in the United States since the mid- 1970's. Karen holds AMS credentials for Early Childhood and Elementary I-II. She has worked in teacher education at all three levels and is currently involved in making Montessori teacher education more accessible in Spanish. She is a faculty member of several teacher education programs, Chair of the MACTE Board of Directors, as well as a Bilingual Specialist for the National Center for Montessori in the Public Sector.

<u>3-B – Daniel Jutras</u> is the Director of the Canadian Montessori Teacher Education Institute and coordinator of eleven MACTE Accredited Montessori training centers. Author, presenter, trainer, he is the product of his own training in Italy under the special assistant of Maria Montessori herself with whom she worked with for 22 years. Such a heritage to share. Dr Jutras returns to share his special insights on Montessori as we move forward into a somewhat uncertain future.

<u>3-C – Beth Langley – M.E.</u> (Beth) Langley is a teacher at heart, and began presenting at conferences on a variety of subjects in 1999. After one of those conferences, about fifteen years ago, Beth was introduced to labyrinths by a Montessori exhibitor. She began studying them, walking them, and participating in workshops. Soon this calling from the labyrinth became her passion. Labyrinths are a versatile tool with adaptations for a variety of activities and purposes from peace education, self-awareness, and creative expression to conflict resolution, community building and ceremonies are easily incorporated into Montessori environments. Beth has developed and facilitated workshops, lectured, designed and constructed labyrinths in the US, as well as Mexico, Canada, and Croatia for Montessori teachers, gardeners, art educators, health practitioners, and labyrinth enthusiasts. In 2007, following years at the Montessori School of Camden, Beth began working for the Institute for Guided Studies, and became a Veriditas certified labyrinth facilitator in 2010. While that may seem like two unrelated subjects, labyrinths and Montessori are natural companions. Beth believes an important element of Montessori teacher education is the element of personal transformation. The shift from being a teacher "in charge" of a classroom to becoming the lead protector of the environment and guide to the curriculum is critical to implementation of authentic Montessori. Personal transformation begins with self-evaluation and that begins with self-examination. By sharing her love of labyrinths during presentations and ceremonies at conferences, Beth has facilitated opportunities for participants to look within, celebrate their journeys, and plan their next steps. She has served on the board of MEPI and The Labyrinth Society and currently serves on the board of the South Carolina Montessori Alliance. She holds a Montessori credential at the early childhood level and a BA from Columbia College.

<u>3-E Rose Dorer</u> did Graduate Study in Administrative Licensure: Education at Saint Mary's University of Minnesota, Winona, MN, completed in January 2001. She received a Master of Arts in Education from Saint Catherine University, St. Paul, MN, in 1997 and also holds a Bachelor of Arts in Elementary Education and a Bachelor of Science in Biology and Chemistry. Rose has been a presenter at several American Montessori Conferences, on the topics of Elementary Montessori Language, and Biology. She has presented at an Australian Montessori Conference, and the Montessori Foundation/International Montessori Council Conference, MEPI conferences, the Polish Montessori Society, the Jakarta Montessori Conference. For over 20 years she taught adults at the post-graduate level as an adjunct faculty member for Saint Catherine University in Minnesota, Westminster College in Utah, and Virginia Montessori Teacher Education Center, Chesapeake, VA.

3-F Antoinette Ursits has been teaching in Montessori for over 20 years. She hold both Early Childhood and Elementary Montessori credentials as well as a Masters in Early Childhood Education, a SC State Teaching Certificate and a SC Montessori 1 Teaching Certificate. While teaching in a Montessori school in Pawley's Island she became aware of the necessity of including Art in the classroom. In 2011, she found herself on the Founding board for Coastal Montessori Charter School where she continues teaching in a Lower Elementary classroom.

4-A The Roll of MACTE Accreditation Level Adm/ All Presented by Rebecca Pelton

The Montessori Accreditation Council for Teacher Education (MACTE) is the only nationally recognized accreditor for teacher education by the US Dept of Education. What does that mean for you? For your program? For your graduates? To the Public? And why seek MACTE accreditation? Dr Pelton will help us understand the importance and the role accreditation plays in the quality of our programs. Time will be spent on the process of accreditation and how you can be actively involved in that process. In addition, time will be given to participants for an "ask us anything". Please come and join this important conversation.

4-B The Logical Path in Montessori Math Level: AC / EL Presented by Michael Dorer & Shanna Honan

Have you ever wondered how properly setting up math shelves can help you understand scope and sequence? Join Michael and Shanna for a dynamic session decoding the various "strands" of Montessori arithmetic. Learn the secrets of the decimal system, the "five Laws", the passage to abstraction, proficiency with basic facts, and the aims of materials that teach the four operations. 4-C Having Fun with Phonetic Grammar Level: EC/EL Presented by Bobbe Spink

Beginning phonetic readers need lots of fun practice to develop reading mastery.
